I am serving as Johnson County's JDAI Site Coordinator and am also a member of the Collaborative. Johnson County held its first JDAI Collaborative Group Meeting on December 9, 2012. At that time, we reviewed the data from the recently completed Detention Utilization Study. This study was completed by each participating county according to a standardized template provided by Annie E. Casey Foundation officials. The information presented is very critical to the group's work. With the data, we were able to identify areas of concern for Johnson County where improvements can potentially be made. Some of the data caused the group to request additional information.

The next step for Johnson County will take place tomorrow, January 20, 2012. The Collaborative Group will again meet to discuss the Purpose of Detention. Our work this time will be facilitated by experienced Annie E. Casey staff that have much experience and success with JDAI in their own jurisdictions. In the end, we want to come to consensus regarding which youth should be placed in detention. This will mean determining which types of offenses and circumstances should call for detaining a youth. Of course, evidence has shown that even short-term placement in detention can harm youth that are low risks for reoffending or for failure to appear in court. This will continue to be emphasized during tomorrow's meeting and throughout the work that will take place over the next couple of years. We anticipate breakout workgroups being formed to analyze case processing, to look at the validity of the current detention risk assessment instrument, and to other issues such as identifying or developing alternatives to detention. The JDAI Collaborative Planning Group will report its recommendations to the Juvenile Corrections Advisory Board for approval. Once approved, the group will also report to the larger Johnson County Criminal Justice Advisory Council. Some recommendations may also require the approval of the Johnson County Board of Commissioners.

At this point, I will lead you through some of the data from Johnson County that Collaborative Group members highlighted at the first meeting. What I will show you today, however, is only a small portion of all of the data in the Detention Utilization Study.


