AN ACT concerning school districts; relating to the local option budget;
 determining supplemental general state aid; statewide levy for public
 schools, exemption therefrom; amending K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 72-6407,
 72-6431, 72-6433, 72-6433d, 72-6434, 72-6435, 72-6451, 74-4939a
 and 79-201x and repealing the existing sections.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

8 New Section 1. On and after the effective date of this act for each 9 fiscal year commencing with fiscal year 2012, notwithstanding the 10 provisions of K.S.A. 74-4920, and amendments thereto, the employer contribution rate for participating employers who are eligible employers 11 12 as specified in subsection (1) of K.S.A. 74-4931, and amendments thereto, shall be a rate equal to the employer contribution rate established 13 pursuant to K.S.A. 74-4939, and amendments thereto, plus 2%. 14 The 15 employer contributions required by this section shall be paid by each 16 school district in accordance with K.S.A. 74-4939a, and amendments 17 thereto.

K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 72-6407 is hereby amended to read as 18 Sec. 2. 19 follows: 72-6407. (a) (1) "Pupil" means any person who is regularly 20 enrolled in a district and attending kindergarten or any of the grades one through 12 maintained by the district or who is regularly enrolled in a 21 22 district and attending kindergarten or any of the grades one through 12 in 23 another district in accordance with an agreement entered into under 24 authority of K.S.A. 72-8233, and amendments thereto, or who is regularly 25 enrolled in a district and attending special education services provided for 26 preschool-aged exceptional children by the district.

27 (2) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (3) of this subsection, a pupil in attendance full time shall be counted as one pupil. A pupil in 28 attendance part time shall be counted as that proportion of one pupil (to 29 the nearest 1/10 that the pupil's attendance bears to full-time attendance. A 30 pupil attending kindergarten shall be counted as  $\frac{1}{2}$  pupil. A pupil enrolled 31 in and attending an institution of postsecondary education which is 32 authorized under the laws of this state to award academic degrees shall be 33 34 counted as one pupil if the pupil's postsecondary education enrollment and attendance together with the pupil's attendance in either of the grades 35 36 11 or 12 is at least  $\frac{5}{6}$  time, otherwise the pupil shall be counted as that

proportion of one pupil (to the nearest 1/10) that the total time of the pupil's 1 2 postsecondary education attendance and attendance in grade 11 or 12, as 3 applicable, bears to full-time attendance. A pupil enrolled in and attending 4 an area vocational school, area vocational-technical school or approved 5 vocational education program shall be counted as one pupil if the pupil's vocational education enrollment and attendance together with the pupil's 6 7 attendance in any of grades nine through 12 is at least 5/6 time, otherwise 8 the pupil shall be counted as that proportion of one pupil (to the nearest 9  $\frac{1}{10}$  that the total time of the pupil's vocational education attendance and attendance in any of grades nine through 12 bears to full-time attendance. 10 A pupil enrolled in a district and attending a non-virtual school and also 11 12 attending a virtual school shall be counted as that proportion of one pupil (to the nearest 1/10) that the pupil's attendance at the non-virtual school 13 bears to full-time attendance. Except as provided by this section for 14 preschool-aged exceptional children and virtual school pupils, a pupil 15 16 enrolled in a district and attending special education and related services, 17 provided for by the district shall be counted as one pupil. A pupil enrolled 18 in a district and attending special education and related services provided 19 for by the district and also attending a virtual school shall be counted as that proportion of one pupil (to the nearest  $\frac{1}{10}$ ) that the pupil's attendance 20 at the non-virtual school bears to full-time attendance. A pupil enrolled in 21 22 a district and attending special education and related services for 23 preschool-aged exceptional children provided for by the district shall be 24 counted as  $\frac{1}{2}$  pupil. A preschool-aged at-risk pupil enrolled in a district 25 and receiving services under an approved at-risk pupil assistance plan 26 maintained by the district shall be counted as  $\frac{1}{2}$  pupil. A pupil in the 27 custody of the secretary of social and rehabilitation services or in the 28 custody of the commissioner of juvenile justice and enrolled in unified 29 school district No. 259, Sedgwick county, Kansas, but housed, 30 maintained, and receiving educational services at the Judge James V. 31 Riddel Boys Ranch, shall be counted as two pupils. Except as provided in 32 section 1 of chapter 76 of the 2009 Session Laws of the state of Kansas, 33 and amendments thereto, a pupil in the custody of the secretary of social 34 and rehabilitation services or in the custody of the commissioner ofjuvenile justice and enrolled in unified school district No. 409, Atchison, 35 36 Kansas, but housed, maintained and receiving educational services at the 37 youth residential center located on the grounds of the former Atchison-38 juvenile correctional facility, shall be counted as two pupils.

(3) A pupil residing at the Flint Hills job corps center shall not be
counted. A pupil confined in and receiving educational services provided
for by a district at a juvenile detention facility shall not be counted. A
pupil enrolled in a district but housed, maintained, and receiving
educational services at a state institution or a psychiatric residential

1 treatment facility shall not be counted.

2 (b) "Preschool-aged exceptional children" means exceptional 3 children, except gifted children, who have attained the age of three years 4 but are under the age of eligibility for attendance at kindergarten.

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(c) "At-risk pupils" means pupils who are eligible for free meals 6 under the national school lunch act and who are enrolled in a district 7 which maintains an approved at-risk pupil assistance plan.

8 (d) "Preschool-aged at-risk pupil" means an at-risk pupil who has attained the age of four years, is under the age of eligibility for attendance 9 at kindergarten, and has been selected by the state board in accordance 10 with guidelines consonant with guidelines governing the selection of 11 pupils for participation in head start programs. 12

"Enrollment" means: (1) (A) Subject to the provisions of 13 (e) paragraph (1)(B), for districts scheduling the school days or school hours 14 of the school term on a trimestral or guarterly basis, the number of pupils 15 regularly enrolled in the district on September 20 plus the number of 16 17 pupils regularly enrolled in the district on February 20 less the number of pupils regularly enrolled on February 20 who were counted in the 18 19 enrollment of the district on September 20; and for districts not specified in this paragraph (1), the number of pupils regularly enrolled in the 20 district on September 20; (B) a pupil who is a foreign exchange student 21 22 shall not be counted unless such student is regularly enrolled in the 23 district on September 20 and attending kindergarten or any of the grades 24 one through 12 maintained by the district for at least one semester or two 25 quarters or the equivalent thereof;

(2) if enrollment in a district in any school year has decreased from 26 27 enrollment in the preceding school year, enrollment of the district in the current school year means whichever is the greater of (A) enrollment in 28 29 the preceding school year minus enrollment in such school year of 30 preschool-aged at-risk pupils, if any such pupils were enrolled, plus 31 enrollment in the current school year of preschool-aged at-risk pupils, if 32 any such pupils are enrolled, or (B) the sum of enrollment in the current 33 school year of preschool-aged at-risk pupils, if any such pupils are 34 enrolled and the average (mean) of the sum of (i) enrollment of the district in the current school year minus enrollment in such school year of 35 preschool-aged at-risk pupils, if any such pupils are enrolled and (ii) 36 37 enrollment in the preceding school year minus enrollment in such school year of preschool-aged at-risk pupils, if any such pupils were enrolled 38 and (iii) enrollment in the school year next preceding the preceding 39 school year minus enrollment in such school year of preschool-aged at-40 41 risk pupils, if any such pupils were enrolled; or

42 (3) the number of pupils as determined under K.S.A. 72-6447 or 43 K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 72-6448, and amendments thereto.

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"Adjusted enrollment" means: (1) Enrollment adjusted by adding 1 (f) 2 at-risk pupil weighting, program weighting, low enrollment weighting, if any, high density at-risk pupil weighting, if any, medium density at-risk 3 4 pupil weighting, if any, nonproficient pupil weighting, if any, high enrollment weighting, if any, declining enrollment weighting, if any, 5 school facilities weighting, if any, ancillary school facilities weighting, if 6 7 any, cost of living weighting, if any, special education and related 8 services weighting, KPERS weighting and transportation weighting to 9 enrollment; or (2) adjusted enrollment as determined under K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 72-6457 or 72-6458, and amendments thereto. 10

11 (g) "At-risk pupil weighting" means an addend component assigned 12 to enrollment of districts on the basis of enrollment of at-risk pupils.

(h) "Program weighting" means an addend component assigned to
 enrollment of districts on the basis of pupil attendance in educational
 programs which differ in cost from regular educational programs.

16 (i) "Low enrollment weighting" means an addend component 17 assigned to enrollment of districts pursuant to K.S.A. 72-6412, and 18 amendments thereto, on the basis of costs attributable to maintenance of 19 educational programs by such districts in comparison with costs 20 attributable to maintenance of educational programs by districts having to 21 which high enrollment weighting is assigned pursuant to K.S.A. 2010 22 Supp. 72-6442b, and amendments thereto.

(j) "School facilities weighting" means an addend component
 assigned to enrollment of districts on the basis of costs attributable to
 commencing operation of new school facilities.

(k) "Transportation weighting" means an addend component
assigned to enrollment of districts on the basis of costs attributable to the
provision or furnishing of transportation.

(1) "Cost of living weighting" means an addend component assigned
to enrollment of districts to which the provisions of K.S.A. 2010 Supp.
72-6449, and amendments thereto, apply on the basis of costs attributable
to the cost of living in the district.

33 (m) "Ancillary school facilities weighting" means an addend component assigned to enrollment of districts to which the provisions of 34 K.S.A. 72-6441, and amendments thereto, apply on the basis of costs 35 attributable to commencing operation of new school facilities. Ancillary 36 37 school facilities weighting may be assigned to enrollment of a district only if the district has levied a tax under authority of K.S.A. 72-6441, and 38 39 amendments thereto, and remitted the proceeds from such tax to the state 40 treasurer. Ancillary school facilities weighting is in addition to assignment of school facilities weighting to enrollment of any district 41 42 eligible for such weighting.

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(n) "Juvenile detention facility" has the meaning ascribed thereto by

1 *K.S.A.* 72-8187, and amendments thereto.

2 (o) "Special education and related services weighting" means an 3 addend component assigned to enrollment of districts on the basis of 4 costs attributable to provision of special education and related services for 5 pupils determined to be exceptional children.

6 (p) "Virtual school" means any school or educational program that: 7 (1) Is offered for credit; (2) uses distance-learning technologies which 8 predominately use internet-based methods to deliver instruction; (3) involves instruction that occurs asynchronously with the teacher and 9 pupil in separate locations; (4) requires the pupil to make academic 10 progress toward the next grade level and matriculation from kindergarten 11 through high school graduation; (5) requires the pupil to demonstrate 12 competence in subject matter for each class or subject in which the pupil 13 is enrolled as part of the virtual school; and (6) requires age-appropriate 14 15 pupils to complete state assessment tests.

(q) "Declining enrollment weighting" means an addend component
assigned to enrollment of districts to which the provisions of K.S.A. 2010
Supp. 72-6451, and amendments thereto, apply on the basis of reduced
revenues attributable to the declining enrollment of the district.

(r) "High enrollment weighting" means an addend component
assigned to enrollment of districts pursuant to K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 726442b, and amendments thereto, on the basis of costs attributable to
maintenance of educational programs by such districts as a correlate to
low enrollment weighting assigned to enrollment of districts pursuant to
K.S.A. 72-6412, and amendments thereto.

(s) "High density at-risk pupil weighting" means an addend
component assigned to enrollment of districts to which the provisions of
K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 72-6455, and amendments thereto, apply.

(t) "Nonproficient pupil" means a pupil who is not eligible for free meals under the national school lunch act and who has scored less than proficient on the mathematics or reading state assessment during the preceding school year and who is enrolled in a district which maintains an approved proficiency assistance plan.

(u) "Nonproficient pupil weighting" means an addend component
assigned to enrollment of districts on the basis of enrollment of
nonproficient pupils pursuant to K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 72-6454, and
amendments thereto.

(v) "Psychiatric residential treatment facility" has the meaning
ascribed thereto by K.S.A. 72-8187, and amendments thereto.

(w) "Medium density at-risk pupil weighting" means an addend
component assigned to enrollment of districts to which the provisions of
K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 72-6459, and amendments thereto, apply.

43 (x) "KPERS weighting" means an addend component assigned to

enrollment of districts on the basis of costs attributable to school
 districts' employer contributions to the Kansas public employees
 retirement system.

4 Sec. 3. K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 72-6431 is hereby amended to read as 5 follows: 72-6431. (a) The board of each district shall levy an ad valorem 6 tax upon the taxable tangible property of the district in the school years 7 specified in subsection (b) for the purpose of:

8 (1) Financing that portion of the district's general fund budget which 9 is not financed from any other source provided by law;

(2) paying a portion of the costs of operating and maintaining public
 schools in partial fulfillment of the constitutional obligation of the
 legislature to finance the educational interests of the state; and

13 (3) with respect to any redevelopment district established prior to 14 July 1, 1997, pursuant to K.S.A. 12-1771, and amendments thereto, 15 paying a portion of the principal and interest on bonds issued by cities 16 under authority of K.S.A. 12-1774, and amendments thereto, for the 17 financing of redevelopment projects upon property located within the 18 district.

(b) The tax required under subsection (a) shall be levied at a rate of
20 25 mills in the school year 2009-2010 2011-2012 and at a rate of 35
21 mills in the school year 2010-20112012-2013.

(c) The proceeds from the tax levied by a district under authority of this section, except the proceeds of such tax levied for the purpose of paying a portion of the principal and interest on bonds issued by cities under authority of K.S.A. 12-1774, and amendments thereto, for the financing of redevelopment projects upon property located within the district, shall be deposited in the general fund of the district.

(d) On June 6 of each year, the amount, if any, by which a district's
local effort exceeds the amount of the district's state financial aid, as
determined by the state board, shall be remitted to the state treasurer.
Upon receipt of any such remittance, the state treasurer shall deposit the
same in the state treasury to the credit of the state school district finance
fund.

(e) No district shall proceed under K.S.A. 79-1964, 79-1964a or 791964b, and amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 72-6433 is hereby amended to read as follows: 72-6433. (a) As used in this section:

(1) "State prescribed percentage" means 31% 26% of state financial
aid of the district in the current school year.

40 (2) "Authorized to adopt a local option budget" means that a district
41 has adopted a resolution under this section, has published the same, and
42 either the resolution was not protested or it was protested and an election
43 was held by which the adoption of a local option budget was approved.

1 (b) In each school year, the board of any district may adopt a local 2 option budget which does not exceed the state prescribed percentage.

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(c) Subject to the limitation of subsection (b), in each school year, the board of any district may adopt, by resolution, a local option budget in an amount not to exceed:

6 (1) (A) The amount which the board was authorized to adopt in 7 accordance with the provisions of this section in effect prior to its 8 amendment by this act; plus

9 (B) the amount which the board was authorized to adopt pursuant to 10 any resolution currently in effect; plus

11 (C) the amount which the board was authorized to adopt pursuant to 12 K.S.A. 72-6444, and amendments thereto, if applicable to the district; or

(2) the statewide average for the preceding school year asdetermined by the state board pursuant to subsection (j).

Except as provided by subsection (e), the adoption of a resolution pursuant to this subsection shall require a majority vote of the members of the board. Such resolution shall be effective upon adoption and shall require no other procedure, authorization or approval.

19 (d) If the board of a district desires to increase its local option budget authority above the amount authorized under subsection (c) or if 20 the board was not authorized to adopt a local option budget in 2006-2007, 21 22 the board may adopt, by resolution, such budget in an amount not to exceed the state prescribed percentage. The adoption of a resolution 23 pursuant to this subsection shall require a majority vote of the members 24 of the board. The resolution shall be published at least once in a 25 newspaper having general circulation in the district. The resolution shall 26 be published in substantial compliance with the following form: 27

33 The board of education of the above-named school district shall be authorized to adopt a local option budget in each school year in an 34 % of the amount of state financial aid. The 35 amount not to exceed local option budget authorized by this resolution may be adopted, unless 36 37 a petition in opposition to the same, signed by not less than 5% of the qualified electors of the school district, is filed with the county election 38 officer of the home county of the school district within 30 days after 39 publication of this resolution. If a petition is filed, the county election 40 officer shall submit the question of whether adoption of the local option 41 budget shall be authorized to the electors of the school district at an 42 43 election called for the purpose or at the next general election, as is

specified by the board of education of the school district. 1 2

8 All of the blanks in the resolution shall be filled as is appropriate. If a sufficient petition is not filed, the board may adopt a local option budget. 9 If a sufficient petition is filed, the board may notify the county election 10 officer of the date of an election to be held to submit the question of 11 whether adoption of a local option budget shall be authorized. Any such 12 election shall be noticed, called and held in the manner provided by 13 K.S.A. 10-120, and amendments thereto. If the board fails to notify the 14 county election officer within 30 days after a sufficient petition is filed, 15 the resolution shall be deemed abandoned and no like resolution shall be 16 17 adopted by the board within the nine months following publication of the 18 resolution.

19 Any resolution authorizing the adoption of a local option budget (e) in excess of 30% 25% of the state financial aid of the district in the 20 current school year shall not become effective unless such resolution has 21 22 been submitted to and approved by a majority of the qualified electors of the school district voting at an election called and held thereon. The 23 election shall be called and held in the manner provided by K.S.A. 10-24 25 120, and amendments thereto.

(f) Unless specifically stated otherwise in the resolution, the 26 authority to adopt a local option budget shall be continuous and 27 permanent. The board of any district which is authorized to adopt a local 28 option budget may choose not to adopt such a budget or may adopt a 29 30 budget in an amount less than the amount authorized. If the board of any district whose authority to adopt a local option budget is not continuous 31 32 and permanent refrains from adopting a local option budget, the authority 33 of such district to adopt a local option budget shall not be extended by 34 such refrainment beyond the period specified in the resolution authorizing adoption of such budget. 35

(g) The board of any district may initiate procedures to renew or 36 37 increase the authority to adopt a local option budget at any time during a school year after the tax levied pursuant to K.S.A. 72-6435, and 38 amendments thereto, is certified to the county clerk under any existing 39 40 authorization.

41 (h) The board of any district that is authorized to adopt a local option budget prior to the effective date of this act under a resolution 42 43 which authorized the adoption of such budget in accordance with the

1 provisions of this section in effect prior to its amendment by this act may

2 continue to operate under such resolution for the period of time specified 3 in the resolution or may abandon the resolution and operate under the 4 provisions of this section as amended by this act. Any such district shall 5 operate under the provisions of this section as amended by this act after 6 the period of time specified in the resolution has expired.

7 (i) Any resolution adopted pursuant to this section may revoke or 8 repeal any resolution previously adopted by the board. If the resolution 9 does not revoke or repeal previously adopted resolutions, all resolutions 10 which are in effect shall expire on the same date. The maximum amount 11 of the local option budget of a school district under all resolutions in 12 effect shall not exceed the state prescribed percentage in any school year.

(j) (1) There is hereby established in every district that adopts a local
 option budget a fund which shall be called the supplemental general fund.
 The fund shall consist of all amounts deposited therein or credited thereto
 according to law.

17 Subject to the limitation imposed under paragraph (3) and (2) 18 subsection (e) of K.S.A. 72-6434, and amendments thereto, amounts in 19 the supplemental general fund may be expended for any purpose for 20 which expenditures from the general fund are authorized or may be transferred to any program weighted fund or categorical fund of the 21 22 district. Amounts in the supplemental general fund attributable to any percentage over 25% 20% of state financial aid determined for the current 23 24 school year may be transferred to the capital improvements fund of the district and the capital outlay fund of the district if such transfers are 25 26 specified in the resolution authorizing the adoption of a local option 27 budget in excess of 25% 20%.

(3) Amounts in the supplemental general fund may not be expended
 for the purpose of making payments under any lease-purchase agreement
 involving the acquisition of land or buildings which is entered into
 pursuant to the provisions of K.S.A. 72-8225, and amendments thereto.

(4) (A) Except as provided in paragraph (B), any unexpended budget
 remaining in the supplemental general fund of a district at the conclusion
 of any school year in which a local option budget is adopted shall be
 maintained in such fund.

36 (B) If the district received supplemental general state aid in the 37 school year, the state board shall determine the ratio of the amount of supplemental general state aid received to the amount of the local option 38 budget of the district for the school year and multiply the total amount of 39 the unexpended budget remaining by such ratio. An amount equal to the 40 amount of the product shall be transferred to the general fund of the 41 42 district or remitted to the state treasurer. Upon receipt of any such 43 remittance, the state treasurer shall deposit the same in the state treasury

to the credit of the state school district finance fund. 1

2 (k) Each year the state board of education shall determine the 3 statewide average percentage of local option budgets legally adopted by 4 school districts for the preceding school year.

5 (1) The provisions of this section shall be subject to the provisions of 6 K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 72-6433d, and amendments thereto.

7 Sec. 5. K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 72-6433d is hereby amended to read as 8 follows: 72-6433d. (a) (1) The provisions of this subsection shall apply in any school year in which the amount of base state aid per pupil is \$4,433 9 10 or less.

11 (2)The board of any school district may adopt a local option budget which does not exceed the local option budget calculated as if the base 12 state aid per pupil was \$4,433 or which does not exceed an amount as 13 authorized by K.S.A. 72-6433, and amendments thereto, whichever is 14 15 greater.

16 (b) (1) The provisions of this subsection shall apply in any school 17 year in which the amount appropriated for state aid for special education 18 and related services is less than the amount appropriated for state aid for 19 special education and related services in school year 2008-2009.

(2) The board of education of any school district may adopt a local 20 option budget which does not exceed the local option budget calculated 21 22 as if the district received state aid for special education and related 23 services equal to the amount of state aid for special education and related 24 services received in school year 2008-2009, or which does not exceed an amount as authorized by K.S.A. 72-6433, and amendments thereto, 25 26 whichever is greater.

The board of education of any school district may exercise the 27 (c) 28 authority granted under subsection (a) or (b) or both subsections (a) and 29 (b).

30 (d) To the extent that the provisions of K.S.A. 72-6433, and 31 amendments thereto, conflict with this section, this section shall control.

32 The provisions of this section shall expire on June 30, 2012. The (e) 33 local option budget of a school district adopting a local option budget under this section shall be determined as follows: 34

35 (1) Determine the adjusted enrollment of the school district, 36 excluding special education weighting; 37

(2) multiply the number determined under paragraph (1) by \$4,433;

(3) add the amount of state aid for special education or related 38 services received by the school district in school year 2009-2010 to the 39 40 product obtained under paragraph (2);

(4) add the amount disbursed to the school district in the current 41 school year under K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 74-4939a, and amendments thereto; 42 43 and

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1 (5) multiply the sum obtained under paragraph (4) by the 2 percentage of the state financial aid stated in the local option budget 3 resolution adopted by the board of education. The resulting product is 4 the local option budget of the school district.

5 Sec. 6. K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 72-6434 is hereby amended to read as 6 follows: 72-6434. (a) In each school year, each district that has adopted a 7 local option budget is eligible for entitlement to an amount of 8 supplemental general state aid. Except as provided by K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 9 72-6434b, and amendments thereto, entitlement of a district to 10 supplemental general state aid shall be determined by the state board as 11 provided in this subsection. The state board shall:

(1) Determine the amount of the assessed valuation per pupil in thepreceding school year of each district in the state;

14 (2) rank the districts from low to high on the basis of the amounts of 15 assessed valuation per pupil determined under *paragraph* (1);

(3) identify the amount of the assessed valuation per pupil located at
the 81.2 95.14 percentile of the amounts ranked under *paragraph* (2);

(4) divide the assessed valuation per pupil of the district in thepreceding school year by the amount identified under *paragraph* (3);

(5) subtract the ratio obtained under (4) from 1.0. If the resulting-20 ratio equals or exceeds 1.0, the eligibility of the district for entitlement to 21 22 supplemental general state aid shall lapse. If the resulting ratio is less than 1.0, the district is entitled to receive supplemental general state aid in an 23 amount which shall be determined by the state board by multiplying the 24 amount of the local option budget of the district by such ratio. The-25 product is the amount of supplemental general state aid the district is 26 27 entitled to receive for the school year. (A) If the quotient obtained under paragraph (4) is less than 1.0, the state board shall subtract the quotient 28 under paragraph (4) from 1.0 and multiply the difference by the amount 29 30 of the local option budget of the district. The resulting product is the 31 amount of supplemental general state aid the district is entitled to receive 32 for the school year.

(B) If the quotient obtained under paragraph (4) equals or exceeds
1.0, the eligibility of the district for entitlement to supplemental general
state aid shall lapse.

(b) If the amount of appropriations for supplemental general state
aid is less than the amount each district is entitled to receive for the
school year, the state board shall prorate the amount appropriated among
the districts in proportion to the amount each district is entitled to receive.

40 (c) The state board shall prescribe the dates upon which the
41 distribution of payments of supplemental general state aid to school
42 districts shall be due. Payments of supplemental general state aid shall be
43 distributed to districts on the dates prescribed by the state board. The state

board shall certify to the director of accounts and reports the amount due
 each district, and the director of accounts and reports shall draw a warrant
 on the state treasurer payable to the treasurer of the district. Upon receipt
 of the warrant, the treasurer of the district shall credit the amount thereof
 to the supplemental general fund of the district to be used for the
 purposes of such fund.

16 (e) (1) Except as provided by paragraph (2), moneys received as 17 supplemental general state aid shall be used to meet the requirements 18 under the school performance accreditation system adopted by the state 19 board, to provide programs and services required by law and to improve 20 student performance.

(2) Amounts of supplemental general state aid attributable to any percentage over 25% of state financial aid determined for the current school year may be transferred to the capital improvements fund of the district and the capital outlay fund of the district if such transfers are specified in the resolution authorizing the adoption of a local option budget in excess of 25%.

(f) For the purposes of determining the total amount of state moneys
paid to school districts, all moneys appropriated as supplemental general
state aid shall be deemed to be state moneys for educational and support
services for school districts.

(1) "School district" or "district" means a school district which: (A)
Has a declining enrollment; and (B) has adopted a local option budget in
an amount which equals at least 31% 26% of the state financial aid for
the school district at the time the district applies to the state court of tax
appeals for authority to make a levy pursuant to this section.

16 (2) "Declining enrollment" means an enrollment which has declined 17 in amount from that of the preceding school year.

18 (b) (1) (A) A school district may levy an ad valorem tax on the 19 taxable tangible property of the district each year for a period of time not to exceed two years in an amount not to exceed the amount authorized by 20 the state court of tax appeals under this subsection for the purpose of 21 22 financing the costs incurred by the state that are directly attributable to assignment of declining enrollment weighting to enrollment of the 23 24 district.
