Professional Social Workers in Kansas: Putting them to work in our communities

On January 10, Governor Brownback announced his mental health initiative in response to a growing awareness that we must provide better mental health services to our most at risk and challenging populations. Fortunately, Kansas and social workers are positioned to respond to the Governor's call to action.

- Social workers are the largest group of mental health providers in Kansas with 6,000 living and working in nearly all 105 Kansas counties. Social workers work in both public and private sectors.
- Each year 600 students graduate from Kansas universities and colleges and become licensed Social Workers ready to practice in their area of interest.
- There are eight schools across Kansas that prepare young people as well as secondcareer students to enter into the profession:
 - Bethel University
 - Fort Hays State University
 - Kansas State University
 - Newman University
 - Pittsburg State University
 - University of Kansas
 - Washburn University, and
 - Wichita State University

Of the eight universities, six offer a baccalaureate degree and four offer a master's degree in Social Work

 Social Workers are licensed at three levels of expertise: Licensed Baccalaureate Social Worker (LBSW); Licensed Master Social Worker (LMSW); Licensed Specialist Clinical Social Worker (LSCSW). They are licensed to practice in all areas of mental health including substance abuse, depression, trauma, mental illnesses, domestic violence, foster care, adoptions, palliative care, aging services, veteran care and more.
