SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for HB 2284 by Representative Henry

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning HB 2284 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

HB 2284 would provide a sales tax exemption for Highland Pride, Inc., for the purpose of promoting community cooperation, progress, development, and self-esteem. The bill would exempt from sales tax all purchases of tangible personal property and services made by or on behalf of the Highland Pride, Inc.

The Department of Revenue estimates that HB 2169 would decrease state revenues by \$200 in FY 2016. Of that total, the State General Fund is estimated to decrease by \$166, while the State Highway Fund is estimated to decrease by \$34. This bill also is estimated to decrease local sales tax revenues by \$50 in FY 2016. The fiscal effect to state and local revenues during subsequent years would be as follows:

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According to the Department of Revenue, reissuing sales tax publications and issuing the tax entity exemption certificate would cost \$1,200 from the State General Fund in FY 2016.

The Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) indicates that the bill would reduce state revenues to the State Highway Fund as noted above. KDOT indicates that when the state receives lower State Highway Fund dollars it may be required to make corresponding reductions to planned expenditures for projects funded under the comprehensive transportation plan, known as T-WORKS.

The Kansas Association of Counties and the League of Kansas Municipalities indicate that the bill would provide a net reduction to local sales tax collections that are used in part to finance local governments. Any fiscal effect associated with HB 2284 is not reflected in *The FY 2016 Governor's Budget Report*.
