SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for HB 2464 by House Committee on Corrections and Juvenile Justice

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning HB 2464 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

Under current law, if an offender absconds from supervision, the court may revoke the probation, assignment to a community correctional services program, suspension of sentence, or nonprision sanction without having first imposed a sanction. HB 2464 would allow the court to sanction absconders by remanding them to the custody of the Secretary of Corrections for a period of 120 days or 180 days without first imposing an intermediate confinement sanction of two to three days.

The Kansas Department of Corrections indicates the agency cannot provide an estimate of the number of offenders who would go before a judge because of absconding supervision and cannot provide an accurate fiscal effect at this time.

The Kansas Sentencing Commission estimates that enactment of HB 2464 would have an effect on adult prison beds; however, the Commission cannot provide an estimate at this time. If the Commission or the Department provides an estimate, a revised fiscal note will be issued. Any fiscal effect associated with HB 2464 is not reflected in *The FY 2017 Governor's Budget Report*.
