## SENATE BILL No. 303

1 AN ACT concerning insurance; relating to coverage for autism spectrum 2 disorder; amending K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 40-2,194 and repealing the 3 existing section.

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Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

6 Section 1. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 40-2,194 is hereby amended to read as 7 follows: 40-2,194. (a) (1) (A) Any large group health insurance policy, 8 medical service plan, contract, hospital service corporation contract, 9 hospital and medical service corporation contract, fraternal benefit society 10 or health maintenance organization which provides coverage for accident 11 and health services and which is delivered, issued for delivery, amended or 12 renewed on or after January 1, 2015, shall provide coverage for the 13 diagnosis and treatment of autism spectrum disorder in any covered 14 individual whose age is less than 12 years. However, coverage for autism 15 spectrum disorder shall not be required of a qualified health plan, as that 16 term is defined in 42 U.S.C. § 18021, as in effect on July 1, 2015.

(B) Any grandfathered individual or group health insurance policy, 17 18 medical service plan, contract, hospital service corporation contract, 19 hospital and medical service corporation contract, fraternal benefit society 20 or health maintenance organization which provides coverage for accident 21 and health services and which is delivered, issued for delivery, amended or 22 renewed on or after January 1, 2016, shall provide coverage for the 23 diagnosis and treatment of autism spectrum disorder in any covered 24 individual whose age is less than 12 years.

25 (2) Such coverage shall be provided in a manner determined in 26 consultation with the autism services provider and the patient. Services 27 provided by autism services providers under this section shall include 28 applied behavior analysis when required by a licensed physician, licensed 29 psychologist or licensed specialist clinical social worker but otherwise 30 shall be limited to the care, services and related equipment prescribed or 31 ordered by a licensed physician, licensed psychologist or licensed 32 specialist clinical social worker.

33 (3) Coverage provided under this section for applied behavior34 analysis shall be subject to a limitation of:

35 (A) 1,300 hours per calendar year for four years beginning on the 36 later of the date of diagnosis or January 1, 2015, for any covered individual diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder between birth and five
 years of age; and

3 (B) except as provided in subparagraph (A), 520 hours per calendar 4 year for any covered individual less than 12 years of age.

5 Upon prior approval by the health benefit plan, such maximum benefit 6 limit may be exceeded if the provision of applied behavior analysis 7 services beyond the maximum limit is medically necessary for such 8 individual. Any payment made by an insurer on behalf of a covered 9 individual for any care, treatment, intervention, service or item, the 10 provision of which was for the treatment of a health condition unrelated to such covered individual's autism spectrum disorder, shall not be applied 11 toward any maximum benefit established under this paragraph. Except for 12 13 the coverage for applied behavior analysis, no coverage required under this section shall be subject to the age and hour limitations described in this 14 15 paragraph.

16 (4) On or after January 1, 2015, through June 30, 2016, reimbursement shall be allowed only for services provided by a provider 17 18 licensed, trained and qualified to provide such services or by an autism 19 specialist or an intensive individual service provider as such terms are 20 defined by the Kansas department for aging and disability services Kansas 21 autism waiver. On or after July 1, 2016, reimbursement shall be allowed 22 only for services provided by an autism service provider licensed or 23 exempt from licensure under the applied behavior analysis licensure act, except that reimbursement shall be allowed for services provided by an 24 25 autism specialist, an intensive individual service provider or any other individual qualified to provide services under the home and community 26 27 based services autism waiver administered by the Kansas department for 28 aging and disability services.

(5) Any insurer or other entity which administers claims for services provided for the treatment of autism spectrum disorder under this section shall have the right and obligation to deny any claim for services based upon medical necessity or a determination that the covered individual has reached the maximum medical improvement for the covered individual's autism spectrum disorder.

35 (6) Except for inpatient services, if an insured is receiving treatment 36 for autism spectrum disorder, such insurer shall have the right to review 37 the treatment plan not more than once in a period of six consecutive 38 months, unless the insurer and the insured's treating physician or 39 psychologist agree that a more frequent review is necessary. Any such 40 agreement regarding the right to review a treatment plan more frequently shall apply only to a particular insured being treated for autism spectrum 41 disorder and shall not apply to all individuals being treated for autism 42 43 spectrum disorder by a physician or psychologist. The cost of obtaining

1 any review or treatment plan shall be borne by the insurer.

2 (7) No insurer can terminate coverage, or refuse to deliver, execute, issue, amend, adjust or renew coverage to an individual solely because the 3 individual is diagnosed with or has received treatment for autism spectrum 4 5 disorder

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- (b) For the purposes of this section:

7 (1) "Applied behavior analysis" means the design, implementation 8 and evaluation of environmental modifications, using behavioral stimuli and consequences, to produce socially significant improvement in human 9 behavior, including the use of direct observation, measurement and 10 functional analysis of the relationship between environment and behavior. 11

12 (2) "Autism spectrum disorder" means a neurobiological disorder, an illness of the nervous system, which includes: 13

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(A) "Autistic disorder," which is:

(i) Six or more items from (a), (b) and (c) of this subparagraph, with 15 16 at least two items from (a) of this subparagraph, and one item each from 17 (b) and (c) of this subparagraph:

(a) Qualitative impairment in social interaction, as manifested by at 18 19 least two of the following:

20 (1) Marked impairment in the use of multiple nonverbal behaviors such as eye-to-eye gaze, facial expression, body postures and gestures to 21 22 regulate social interaction;

23 (2) failure to develop peer relationships appropriate to developmental 24 level:

25 (3) a lack of spontaneous seeking to share enjoyment, interests or achievements with other people; or 26

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(4) lack of social or emotional reciprocity;

28 (b) qualitative impairments in communication as manifested by at 29 least one of the following: 30

(1) Delay in, or total lack of, the development of spoken language;

(2) in individuals with adequate speech, marked impairment in the 31 32 ability to initiate or sustain a conversation with others;

33 (3) stereotyped and repetitive use of language or idiosyncratic 34 language; or

35 (4) lack of varied, spontaneous make-believe play or social imitative 36 play appropriate to developmental level;

37 (c) restricted repetitive and stereotyped patterns of behavior, interests 38 and activities, as manifested by at least one of the following:

39 (1) Encompassing preoccupation with one or more stereotyped and restricted patterns of interest that is abnormal either in intensity or focus; 40

41 (2) apparently inflexible adherence to specific, nonfunctional routines 42 or rituals:

43 (3) stereotyped and repetitive motor mannerisms; or

1 (4) persistent preoccupation with parts of objects: (ii) delays or abnormal functioning in at least one of the following 2 areas, with onset prior to age three years, including social interaction, 3 language as used in social communication or symbolic or imaginative 4 5 play; and 6 (iii) the disturbance is not better accounted for by Rett's disorder or 7 childhood disintegrative disorder; 8 (B) "Asperger's disorder," which is: 9 (i) a qualitative impairment in social interaction, as manifested by at least two of the following: 10 (a) Marked impairment in the use of multiple nonverbal behaviors 11 such as eye-to-eye gaze, facial expression, body postures and gestures to 12 regulate social interaction; 13 14 (b) failure to develop peer relationships appropriate to developmental 15 level: 16 (c) lack of spontaneous seeking to share enjoyment, interests or 17 achievements with other people; or (d) lack of social or emotional reciprocity; 18 19 (ii) restricted repetitive and stereotyped patterns of behavior, interests and activities, as manifested by at least one of the following: 20 (a) Encompassing preoccupation with one or more stereotyped and 21 22 restricted patterns of interest that is abnormal either in intensity or focus; 23 (b) apparently inflexible adherence to specific, nonfunctional routines 24 or rituals: 25 (c) stereotyped and repetitive motor mannerisms; or 26 (d) persistent preoccupation with parts of objects; (iii) the disturbance causes clinically significant impairment in social, 27 occupational or other important areas of functioning; 28 29 (iv) there is no clinically significant general delay in language; (v) there is no clinically significant delay in cognitive development or 30 in the development of age-appropriate self-help skills, adaptive behavior 31 32 (other than in social interaction), and curiosity about the environment in 33 childhood: and 34 (vi) criteria are not met for another specific pervasive developmental 35 disorder or schizophrenia; 36 "pervasive developmental disorder not otherwise specified," is a (C) 37 severe and pervasive impairment in the development of reciprocal social 38 interaction associated with impairment in either verbal or nonverbal 39 communication skills or with the presence of stereotyped behavior, interests and activities, but the criteria are not met for a specific pervasive 40 41 developmental disorder, schizophrenia, schizotypal personality disorder, or 42 avoidant personality disorder; 43 (D) "Rett's disorder," includes:

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1 (i) All of the following: 2 (a) Apparently normal p

(a) Apparently normal prenatal and perinatal development;

3 (b) apparently normal psychomotor development through the first 4 five months after birth; and

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(c) normal head circumference at birth;

6 (ii) onset of all of the following after the period of normal 7 development:

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(a) Deceleration of head growth between ages five and 48 months;

9 (b) loss of previously acquired purposeful hand skills between ages 10 five and 30 months with the subsequent development of stereotyped hand 11 movements;

(c) loss of social engagement early in the course of development;

(d) appearance of poorly coordinated gait or trunk movements; and

(e) severely impaired expressive and receptive language developmentwith severe psychomotor retardation;

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(E) "childhood disintegrative disorder," is:

(i) Apparently normal development for at least the first two years
after birth as manifested by the presence of age-appropriate verbal and
nonverbal communication, social relationships, play and adaptive
behavior;

(ii) clinically significant loss of previously acquired skills in at least
 two of the following areas: Expressive or receptive language, social skills
 or adaptive behavior, bowel or bladder control or play and motor skills;

(iii) abnormalities of functioning in at least two of the following
 areas: Qualitative impairment in social interaction; qualitative impairments
 in communication; restricted, repetitive and stereotyped patterns of
 behavior, interests and activities, including motor stereotypies and
 mannerisms; and

(iv) the disturbance is not better accounted for by another specificpervasive developmental disorder or by schizophrenia.

(3) "Diagnosis of autism spectrum disorder" means any medically
necessary assessment, evaluation or test performed by a licensed
physician, licensed psychologist or licensed specialist clinical social
worker to determine whether an individual has autism spectrum disorder.

(4) "Grandfathered health benefit plan" shall have the meaning
ascribed to such term in 42 U.S.C. § 18011. The term "grandfathered
health benefit plan" includes both small employer group health benefit
plans that are grandfathered and individual health benefit plans that are
grandfathered.

40 (5) "Health benefit plan" shall have the meaning ascribed to such 41 term in K.S.A. 40-4602, and amendments thereto.

42 (6) "Large employer" means, in connection with a group health 43 benefit plan with respect to a calendar year and a plan year, an employer who employed an average of at least 51 employees on business days
 during the preceding calendar year and who employs at least one employee
 on the first day of the plan year.

4 (7) "Small employer" means, in connection with a group health 5 benefit plan with respect to a calendar year and a plan year, an employer 6 who employed an average of at least one but not more than 50 employees 7 on business days during the preceding calendar year and who employs at 8 least one employee on the first day of the plan year.

9 (c) If an individual has been diagnosed as having autism spectrum 10 disorder meeting the diagnostic criteria described in the edition of the diagnostic and statistical manual of mental disorders available at the time 11 12 of diagnosis, then that individual shall not be required to undergo any 13 additional or repeated evaluation based upon the adoption of a subsequent edition of the diagnostic and statistical manual of mental disorders adopted 14 by rules and regulations of the behavioral sciences regulatory board in 15 16 order to remain eligible for coverage under this section.

17 (d) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (a), no individual or 18 group health insurance policy, medical service plan, contract, hospital 19 service corporation contract, hospital and medical service corporation 20 contract, fraternal benefit society or health maintenance organization 21 which provides coverage for accident and health services and which 22 provides coverage with respect to autism spectrum disorder shall:

(1) Impose on the coverage required by this section any dollar limits,
 deductibles or coinsurance provisions that are less favorable to an insured
 than the dollar limits, deductibles or coinsurance provisions that apply to
 physical illness generally under the accident and sickness insurance policy;
 or

(2) impose on the coverage required by this section any limit upon the
 number of visits that a covered individual may make for treatment of
 autism spectrum disorder.

31 (e) The provisions of this section shall not apply to any policy or 32 certificate which provides coverage for any specified disease, specified 33 accident or accident-only coverage, credit, dental, disability income, 34 hospital indemnity, long-term care insurance as defined by K.S.A. 40-2227, and amendments thereto, vision care or any other limited 35 36 supplemental benefit nor to any medicare supplement policy of insurance 37 as defined by the commissioner of insurance by rules and regulations, any 38 coverage issued as a supplement to liability insurance, workers' 39 compensation or similar insurance, automobile medical-payment insurance 40 or any insurance under which benefits are payable with or without regard 41 to fault, whether written on a group, blanket or individual basis.

42 (f) This section shall not be construed as limiting benefits that are 43 otherwise available to an individual under any individual or group health insurance policy, medical service plan, contract, hospital service
 corporation contract, hospital and medical service corporation contract,
 fraternal benefit society or health maintenance organization which
 provides coverage for accident and health services.

5 (g) The provisions of K.S.A. 40-2249a, and amendments thereto, 6 shall not apply to the provisions of this section.

7 (h) The commissioner of the department of insurance shall grant a 8 small employer with a group health benefit plan a waiver from the 9 provisions of this section, if the small employer demonstrates to the 10 commissioner by actual claims experience over any consecutive twelvemonth period that compliance with this section has increased the cost of 11 12 the health insurance policy by an amount of two and a half percent or greater over the period of a calendar year in premium costs to the small 13 14 employer.

15 (i) Nothing contained in this section shall require coverage for or 16 payment of full or partial day care or habilitation services, community 17 support services, services at intermediate care facilities, school-based 18 rehabilitative services or overnight, boarding and extended stay services at 19 facilities for autism patients. Only services actually rendered on an hourly 20 basis or fractional portion thereof by certified applied behavior analysis 21 (ABA) providers as herein defined shall be required to be covered under 22 this section. Nothing in this section shall require coverage or payment 23 hereunder for services that are otherwise provided, authorized or required 24 to be provided by public or private schools receiving any state or federal 25 funding for such services.

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Sec. 2. K.S.A. 2014 Supp. 40-2,194 is hereby repealed.
