AN ACT concerning health care; relating to palliative care; establishing
 the palliative care and quality of life interdisciplinary advisory council;
 palliative care consumer and professional information and education
 program.

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6 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

7 Section 1. (a) There is hereby created the palliative care and quality 8 of life interdisciplinary advisory council within the department of health 9 and environment. The purpose of this council is to develop 10 recommendations and advise the department of health and environment on 11 matters related to the establishment, maintenance, operation, outcomes evaluation of palliative care initiatives in the state, and effectiveness of the 12 13 palliative care consumer and professional information and education 14 program.

15 (b) (1) The palliative care and quality of life interdisciplinary 16 advisory council shall consist of 12 13 members appointed on or before October 1.-2017 2018. The members shall be appointed as follows: (A) 17 Two members appointed by the governor; (B) two members appointed by 18 19 the speaker of the house of representatives; (C) one member appointed by 20 the minority leader of the house of representatives; (D) two members 21 appointed by the president of the senate; (E) one member appointed by the 22 minority leader of the senate; (F) one member appointed by the secretary 23 of health and environment who shall represent the department of health 24 and environment; (G) one member appointed by the secretary for aging 25 and disability services who shall represent the department for aging and 26 disability services; (H) one member of the house committee on health and 27 human services appointed by the chair of the house committee on health and human services; and (I) one member appointed by the majority 28 leader of the house of representatives; and (J) one member of the senate 29 committee on public health and welfare appointed by the chair of the 30 senate committee on public health and welfare. 31

32 (2) Members of the palliative care and quality of life interdisciplinary

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advisory council shall be individuals with experience and expertise in 1 2 interdisciplinary palliative care medical, nursing, social work, pharmacy and spiritual guidance. Membership shall specifically include health care 3 professionals having palliative care work experience or expertise in 4 5 palliative care delivery models in a variety of inpatient, outpatient and 6 community settings and with a variety of populations including pediatric, 7 youth and adults. At least two members of the palliative care and quality of 8 life interdisciplinary advisory council shall be board-certified hospice and palliative medicine physicians or nurses, and at least one member shall 9 be a patient or a caregiver. 10

(3) Members of the palliative care and quality of life interdisciplinary advisory council shall serve for a period of three years and shall serve at the pleasure of their respective appointing authorities. The members shall elect a chair and vice chair whose duties shall be established by the council. The department of health and environment shall fix a time and place for regular meetings of the council, which shall meet at least twice annually.

(4) Members of the palliative care and quality of life
interdisciplinary advisory council shall serve without compensation, but
shall be reimbursed for their actual and necessary expenses incurred in the
performance of their duties.

(c) "Palliative care" means an approach that improves the quality of life of patients and their families facing the problem associated with life-threatening illness, through the prevention and relief of suffering by means of early identification and impeccable assessment and treatment of pain and other problems, physical, psychosocial and spiritual. Palliative care:

(1) Provides relief from pain and other distressing symptoms;

29 (2) affirms life and regards dying as a normal process;

30 (3) intends neither to hasten or postpone death;

(4) integrates the psychological and spiritual aspects of patient
 care;

(5) offers a support system to help patients live as actively as
 possible until death;

(6) offers a support system to help the family cope during the
 patient's illness and in their own bereavement;

(7) uses a team approach to address the needs of patients and
their families, including bereavement counseling, if indicated;

39 (8) will enhance quality of life, and may also positively influence40 the course of illness; and

(9) is applicable early in the course of illness, in conjunction with
other therapies that are intended to prolong life, such as
chemotherapy or radiation therapy, and includes those investigations

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1 needed to better understand and manage distressing clinical 2 complications.

3 {(d) The department of health and environment shall implement
 4 this section within the limitations of existing moneys and resources
 5 already allocated to the department.}

Sec. 2. (a) There is hereby created the state palliative care consumer 6 7 and professional information and education program in the department of 8 health and environment. The purpose of the state palliative care consumer and professional information and education program is to maximize the 9 effectiveness of palliative care initiatives in the state by ensuring that 10 comprehensive and accurate information and education about palliative 11 care is available to the public, health care providers and health care 12 13 facilities.

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(b) The department of health and environment:

(1) Shall publish information and resources on its website, including
links to external resources, about palliative care for the public, health care
providers and health care facilities. The information shall include, but not
be limited to, the following:

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(A) Continuing education opportunities for health care providers;

(B) information about palliative care delivery in home, primary,secondary and tertiary environments; and

22 (C) consumer educational materials and referral information for 23 palliative care, including hospice;

(2) may develop and implement any other initiatives regarding
 palliative care services and education that it determines would further the
 purposes of this section; and

(3) shall consult with the palliative care and quality of lifeinterdisciplinary advisory council.

29 (c) "Palliative care" shall have the meaning ascribed to it in 30 section 1, and amendments thereto.

31 <u>{(d) The department of health and environment shall implement</u> 32 <u>this section within the limitations of existing moneys and resources</u> 33 <u>already allocated to the department.</u>}

34 Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its 35 publication in the statute book.
