AN ACT concerning health and healthcare; relating to the practice of 1 2 naturopathy; licensure and regulation of naturopathic doctors; scope of practice; amending K.S.A. 65-1626, 65-4101, 65-7202, 65-7207, 65-3 7208, 65-7209, 65-7210, 65-7214 and 65-7215 and repealing the 4 5 existing sections; also repealing K.S.A. 65-7212. 6 7 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas: 8 New Section 1. (a) A naturopathic doctor may: 9 (1) Order and perform physical examinations, orifical examinations, 10 excluding endoscopies, and laboratory examinations for diagnostic 11 purposes, including, but not limited to, phlebotomy, clinical laboratory 12 tests, speculum examinations and physiological function tests; 13 (2) order diagnostic imaging studies, including, but not limited to, xray, ultrasound, mammogram, bone densitometry, computed tomography, 14 magnetic resonance imaging and electrocardiograms. Naturopathic doctors 15 16 shall refer patients to an appropriately licensed and qualified healthcare 17 professional to conduct diagnostic imaging studies and interpret the 18 results: 19 (3) prescribe, recommend or administer: (A) Food, food extracts, 20 vitamins. minerals. enzymes, whole gland thyroid, botanicals. 21 homeopathic preparations, nonprescription drugs, plant substances that are 22 not designated as prescription drugs or controlled substances under the 23 pharmacy act of the state of Kansas or the unified controlled substances 24 act, topical drugs as defined in K.S.A. 65-7202, and amendments thereto; 25 (B) human cellular and tissue-based products that are not regulated as 26 drugs; (C) healthcare and nutritional counseling, including fertility 27 counseling; (D) dietary therapy, naturopathic physical applications, barrier 28 contraceptive devices and intrauterine insemination; (E) non-diagnostic 29 ultrasound guided therapy, (F) substances that are authorized for 30 intradermal, subcutaneous, intramuscular, intravenous, ligamentous, 31 tendinous, periarticular, and intra-articular administration, including 32 proliferative therapy, as authorized in a written protocol agreed upon 33 between a responsible physician and a naturopathic doctor as provided by 34 the naturopathic doctor licensure act; (G) biofeedback and neurofeedback 35 therapies; and (H) durable medical equipment related to naturopathic 36 practice authorized by the naturopathic doctor licensure act and when

authorized in a written protocol agreed upon between a responsible
 physician and a naturopathic doctor as provided by the naturopathic doctor
 licensure act;

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(4) perform minor office procedures and naturopathic acupuncture;

5 (5) utilize routes of administration that include oral, nasal, topical, 6 auricular, ocular, rectal, vaginal, transdermal, intradermal, subcutaneous, 7 intramuscular and intravenous; and

8 (6) utilize ultrasound guidance in the performance of services 9 authorized by the naturopathic doctor licensure act.

10 (b) A naturopathic doctor shall not perform surgery, obstetrics, 11 administer ionizing radiation, administer, conduct or interpret the results of 12 diagnostic imaging studies, or prescribe, dispense or administer any 13 controlled substances as defined in K.S.A. 65-4101, and amendments 14 thereto, or any prescription-only drugs except those authorized by a 15 protocol with a responsible physician.

16 (c) This section shall be a part of and supplemental to the 17 naturopathic doctor licensure act.

New Sec. 2. (a) A naturopathic doctor may prescribe drugs or medical
devices pursuant to a written protocol as authorized by a responsible
physician.

21 (b) Each written protocol shall be signed and dated by the physician 22 and naturopathic doctor, shall contain a precise and detailed medical plan 23 of care for each classification of disease or injury for which the naturopathic doctor is authorized to prescribe and shall specify all drugs 24 25 and medical devices that may be prescribed by the naturopathic doctor. A written protocol shall be in effect for a period not to exceed one year from 26 27 the date of its adoption and may be extended for additional one-year 28 periods by agreement of the responsible physician and the naturopathic 29 doctor.

(c) Each prescription order by a naturopathic doctor shall be in
 writing, including an electronically recorded and transmitted
 communication. The order shall include the name, address and telephone
 number of the responsible physician.

(d) A naturopathic doctor shall not prescribe a drug or device for
 which the naturopathic doctor lacks adequate education, training and
 experience to safely manage the medical regimen.

(e) A naturopathic doctor shall register with the United States drugenforcement administration in order to prescribe controlled substances.

(f) This section shall be a part of and supplemental to the naturopathicdoctor licensure act.

41 New Sec. 3. (a) The practice of naturopathy shall not be construed to 42 include the following persons:

43 (1) Persons whose professional services are performed under the

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supervision or by order of or referral from a naturopathic doctor licensed
 under the naturopathic doctor licensure act;

3 (2) persons licensed to engage in the practice of naturopathic 4 medicine in another state, territory or the District of Columbia when called 5 into this state in consultation with a naturopathic doctor licensed in this 6 state; and

7 (3) practitioners of the healing arts licensed under the Kansas healing 8 arts act and practicing their professions or persons performing services 9 pursuant to the delegation of a licensee under K.S.A. 65-2872(g), and 10 amendments thereto.

(b) Nothing in the naturopathic doctor licensure act shall be construed
 to restrict any person licensed or regulated by the state of Kansas from
 engaging in the profession or practice for which they are licensed or
 regulated.

15 (c) This section shall be a part of and supplemental to the 16 naturopathic doctor licensure act.

17 New Sec. 4. (a) Every naturopathic doctor shall maintain a record for 18 each patient for whom a professional service is rendered, including 19 documentation of dates of professional services, pertinent and significant 20 information regarding the patient's condition, examinations and testing, all 21 findings and results, diagnosis and treatment performed or recommended, 22 patient progress and all patient records received from other providers.

(b) Every naturopathic doctor shall maintain a patient's record for a
 minimum of seven years from the date the licensee provided the
 professional service recorded.

26 (c) This section shall be a part of and supplemental to the 27 naturopathic doctor licensure act.

New Sec. 5. (a) If any provision of the naturopathic doctor licensure act or application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect any other provision or application that can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of the naturopathic doctor licensure act are declared to be severable.

34 (b) This section shall be a part of and supplemental to the 35 naturopathic doctor licensure act.

Sec. 6. K.S.A. 65-1626 is hereby amended to read as follows: 651626. For the purposes of this act:

(a) "Administer" means the direct application of a drug, whether by
 injection, inhalation, ingestion or any other means, to the body of a patient
 or research subject by:

(1) A practitioner or pursuant to the lawful direction of a practitioner;

42 (2) the patient or research subject at the direction and in the presence43 of the practitioner; or

1 (3) a pharmacist as authorized in K.S.A. 65-1635a, and amendments 2 thereto.

3 (b) "Agent" means an authorized person who acts on behalf of or at 4 the direction of a manufacturer, repackager, wholesale distributor, third-5 party logistics provider or dispenser but does not include a common 6 carrier, public warehouseman or employee of the carrier or warehouseman 7 when acting in the usual and lawful course of the carrier's or 8 warehouseman's business.

9 (c) "Application service provider" means an entity that sells 10 electronic prescription or pharmacy prescription applications as a hosted 11 service where the entity controls access to the application and maintains 12 the software and records on its server.

(d) "Automated dispensing system" means a robotic or mechanical
system controlled by a computer that: (1) Performs operations or activities,
other than compounding or administration, relative to the storage,
packaging, labeling, dispensing or distribution of drugs; (2) collects,
controls and maintains all transaction information; and (3) operates in
accordance with the board's rules and regulations.

(e) "Biological product" means the same as defined in 42 U.S.C. §
262(i), as in effect on January 1, 2017.

(f) "Board" means the state board of pharmacy created by K.S.A. 741603, and amendments thereto.

(g) "Brand exchange," in the case of a drug prescribed, means the
dispensing of a different drug product of the same dosage form and
strength and of the same generic name as the brand name drug product
prescribed, and in the case of a biological product prescribed, means the
dispensing of an interchangeable biological product.

(h) "Brand name" means the registered trademark name given to adrug product by its manufacturer, labeler or distributor.

(i) "Co-licensed partner" means a person or pharmaceutical
manufacturer that has entered into an agreement with another
pharmaceutical manufacturer or an affiliate of the manufacturer to engage
in a business activity or occupation related to the manufacture or
distribution of a product.

(j) "Common carrier" means any person who undertakes, whether
 directly or by any other arrangement, to transport property, including
 drugs, for compensation.

(k) "Compounding" means the combining of components into a
 compounded preparation under either of the following conditions:

40 (1) As the result of a practitioner's prescription drug order or initiative
41 based on the practitioner-patient-pharmacist relationship in the course of
42 professional practice to meet the specialized medical need of an individual
43 patient of the practitioner that cannot be filled by an FDA-approved drug;

1 or

2 (2) for the purpose of, or incidental to, research, teaching or chemical 3 analysis, and not for sale or dispensing.

4 Compounding includes the preparation of drugs or devices in 5 anticipation of receiving prescription drug orders based on routine, 6 regularly observed prescribing patterns.

Compounding does not include reconstituting any oral or topical drug
according to the FDA-approved labeling for the drug or preparing any
sterile or nonsterile preparation that is essentially a copy of a commercially
available product.

(l) "DEA" means the U.S. department of justice, drug enforcementadministration.

(m) "Deliver" or "delivery" means the actual, constructive or
 attempted transfer from one person to another of any drug whether or not
 an agency relationship exists.

(n) "Direct supervision" means the process by which the responsible
pharmacist shall observe and direct the activities of a pharmacy student or
pharmacy technician to a sufficient degree to assure that all such activities
are performed accurately, safely and without risk or harm to patients, and
complete the final check before dispensing.

(o) "Dispense" or "dispensing" means to deliver prescription
 medication to the ultimate user or research subject by or pursuant to the
 lawful order of a practitioner or pursuant to the prescription of a mid-level
 practitioner.

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(p) "Dispenser" means:

(1) A practitioner or pharmacist who dispenses prescription
medication, or a physician assistant who has authority to dispense
prescription-only drugs in accordance with K.S.A. 65-28a08(b), and
amendments thereto; or

(2) a retail pharmacy, hospital pharmacy or group of pharmacies
under common ownership and control that do not act as a wholesale
distributor, or affiliated warehouses or distribution centers of such entities
under common ownership and control that do not act as a wholesale
distributor.

(q) "Distribute" or "distribution" means to deliver, offer to deliver,
sell, offer to sell, purchase, trade, transfer, broker, give away, handle, store
or receive, other than by administering or dispensing, any product, but
does not include dispensing a product pursuant to a prescription executed
in accordance with 21 U.S.C. § 353 or the dispensing of a product
approved under 21 U.S.C. § 360b.

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(r) "Distributor" means a person or entity that distributes a drug.

42 (s) "Drop shipment" means the sale, by a manufacturer, repackager or 43 exclusive distributor, of the manufacturer's prescription drug to a wholesale distributor whereby the wholesale distributor takes title but not
 possession of such prescription drug and the wholesale distributor invoices
 the dispenser, and the dispenser receives delivery of the prescription drug
 directly from the manufacturer, repackager, third-party logistics provider
 or exclusive distributor, of such prescription drug.

6 "Drug" means: (1) Articles recognized in the official United States (t) 7 pharmacopeia, or other such official compendiums of the United States, or 8 official national formulary, or any supplement to any of them; (2) articles 9 intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment or prevention 10 of disease in human or other animals; (3) articles, other than food, intended to affect the structure or any function of the body of human or 11 12 other animals; and (4) articles intended for use as a component of any 13 articles specified in paragraph (1), (2) or (3); but does not include devices or their components, parts or accessories, except that the term "drug" shall 14 15 not include amygdalin (laetrile) or any livestock remedy, if such livestock 16 remedy had been registered in accordance with the provisions of article 5 17 of chapter 47 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, prior to its repeal.

18 (u) "Durable medical equipment" means equipment that: (1) Provides 19 therapeutic benefits or enables an individual to perform certain tasks that 20 the individual is unable to otherwise undertake due to certain medical 21 conditions or illnesses; (2) is primarily and customarily used to serve a 22 medical purpose; (3) generally is not useful to a person in the absence of 23 an illness or injury; (4) can withstand repeated use; (5) is appropriate for 24 use in the home, long-term care facility or medical care facility, but may 25 be transported to other locations to allow the individual to complete instrumental activities of daily living that are more complex tasks required 26 27 for independent living; and (6) may include devices and medical supplies 28 or other similar equipment determined by the board in rules and 29 regulations adopted by the board.

(v) "Electronic prescription" means an electronically prepared
 prescription that is authorized and transmitted from the prescriber to the
 pharmacy by means of electronic transmission.

(w) "Electronic prescription application" means software that is used
 to create electronic prescriptions and that is intended to be installed on the
 prescriber's computers and servers where access and records are controlled
 by the prescriber.

(x) "Electronic signature" means a confidential personalized digital
key, code, number or other method for secure electronic data transmissions
that identifies a particular person as the source of the message,
authenticates the signatory of the message and indicates the person's
approval of the information contained in the transmission.

42 (y) "Electronic transmission" means the transmission of an electronic 43 prescription, formatted as an electronic data file, from a prescriber's electronic prescription application to a pharmacy's computer, where the
 data file is imported into the pharmacy prescription application.

3 (z) "Electronically prepared prescription" means a prescription that is 4 generated using an electronic prescription application.

5 (aa) "Exclusive distributor" means the wholesale distributor that 6 directly purchased the product from the manufacturer and is the sole 7 distributor of that manufacturer's product to a subsequent repackager, 8 wholesale distributor or dispenser.

9 (bb) "FDA" means the U.S. department of health and human services, 10 food and drug administration.

(cc) "Facsimile transmission" or "fax transmission" means the 11 12 transmission of a digital image of a prescription from the prescriber or the prescriber's agent to the pharmacy. "Facsimile transmission" includes, but 13 is not limited to, transmission of a written prescription between the 14 prescriber's fax machine and the pharmacy's fax machine; transmission of 15 16 an electronically prepared prescription from the prescriber's electronic prescription application to the pharmacy's fax machine, computer or 17 printer; or transmission of an electronically prepared prescription from the 18 19 prescriber's fax machine to the pharmacy's fax machine, computer or 20 printer.

(dd) "Generic name" means the established chemical name or officialname of a drug or drug product.

(ee) "Health care entity" means any person that provides diagnostic,
 medical, surgical or dental treatment or rehabilitative care but does not
 include any retail pharmacy or wholesale distributor.

(ff) (1) "Institutional drug room" means any location where
prescription-only drugs are stored and from which prescription-only drugs
are administered or dispensed and that is maintained or operated for the
purpose of providing the drug needs of:

30 (A) Inmates of a jail or correctional institution or facility;

(B) residents of a juvenile detention facility, as defined by the revised
Kansas code for care of children and the revised Kansas juvenile justice
code;

34 (C) students of a public or private university or college, a community
 35 college or any other institution of higher learning that is located in Kansas;

36 (D) employees of a business or other employer; or

37 (E) persons receiving inpatient hospice services.

- 38 (2) "Institutional drug room" does not include:
- 39 (A) Any registered pharmacy;
- 40 (B) any office of a practitioner; or

41 (C) a location where no prescription-only drugs are dispensed and no 42 prescription-only drugs other than individual prescriptions are stored or 43 administered.

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1 (gg) "Interchangeable biological product" means a biological product 2 that the FDA has:

3 (1) Licensed and determined meets the standards for 4 "interchangeability" as defined in 42 U.S.C. § 262(k), as in effect on 5 January 1, 2017; or

6 (2) determined to be therapeutically equivalent as set forth in the 7 latest edition or supplement to the FDA's approved drug products with 8 therapeutic equivalence evaluations.

9 (hh) "Intermediary" means any technology system that receives and 10 transmits an electronic prescription between the prescriber and the 11 pharmacy.

(ii) "Intracompany transaction" means any transaction or transfer
 between any division, subsidiary, parent or affiliated or related company
 under common ownership or control of a corporate entity, or any
 transaction or transfer between co-licensed partners.

16 (jj) "Label" means a display of written, printed or graphic matter 17 upon the immediate container of any drug.

(kk) "Labeling" means the process of preparing and affixing a label to
 any drug container, exclusive of the labeling by a manufacturer, packer or
 distributor of a non-prescription drug or commercially packaged legend
 drug.

(11) "Long-term care facility" means "nursing facility," as defined in
K.S.A. 39-923, and amendments thereto.

(mm) "Medical care facility" means the same as defined in K.S.A.
65-425, and amendments thereto, except that the term also includes
facilities licensed under the provisions of K.S.A. 2018 Supp. 39-2001 et
seq., and amendments thereto, except community mental health centers
and facilities for people with intellectual disability.

(nn) "Manufacture" means the production, preparation, propagation, 29 compounding, conversion or processing of a drug either directly or 30 31 indirectly by extraction from substances of natural origin, independently 32 by means of chemical or biological synthesis or by a combination of extraction and chemical or biological synthesis or the packaging or 33 repackaging of the drug or labeling or relabeling of its container, except 34 35 that this term does not include the preparation or compounding of a drug by an individual for the individual's own use or the preparation, 36 37 compounding, packaging or labeling of a drug by:

(1) A practitioner or a practitioner's authorized agent incident to such
 practitioner's administering or dispensing of a drug in the course of the
 practitioner's professional practice;

41 (2) a practitioner, by a practitioner's authorized agent or under a
42 practitioner's supervision for the purpose of, or as an incident to, research,
43 teaching or chemical analysis and not for sale; or

1 (3) a pharmacist or the pharmacist's authorized agent acting under the 2 direct supervision of the pharmacist for the purpose of, or incident to, the 3 dispensing of a drug by the pharmacist.

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(oo) "Manufacturer" means:

5 (1) A person that holds an application approved under section 505 of 6 the federal food, drug and cosmetic act or a license issued under section 7 351 of the federal public health service act for such drug or, if such drug is 8 not the subject of an approved application or license, the person who 9 manufactured the drug;

(2) a co-licensed partner of the person described in paragraph (1) that
obtains the drug directly from a person described in paragraph (1) or (3);
or

(3) an affiliate of a person described in paragraph (1) or (2) that
 receives the product directly from a person described in paragraph (1) or
 (2).

16 (pp) "Mid-level practitioner" means a certified nurse-midwife engaging in the independent practice of midwifery under the independent 17 practice of midwifery act, an advanced practice registered nurse issued a 18 license pursuant to K.S.A. 65-1131, and amendments thereto, who has 19 authority to prescribe drugs pursuant to a written protocol with a 20 21 responsible physician under K.S.A. 65-1130, and amendments thereto, a 22 naturopathic doctor licensed under the naturopathic doctor licensure act 23 who has authority to prescribe drugs pursuant to a written protocol with a responsible physician under section 2, and amendments thereto, or a 24 physician assistant licensed pursuant to the physician assistant licensure 25 26 act who has authority to prescribe drugs pursuant to a written agreement 27 with a supervising physician under K.S.A. 65-28a08, and amendments 28 thereto.

29 (qq) "Nonresident pharmacy" means a pharmacy located outside of30 Kansas.

(rr) "Outsourcing facility" or "virtual outsourcing facility" means a
facility at one geographic location or address that is engaged in the
compounding of sterile drugs and has registered with the FDA as an
outsourcing facility pursuant to 21 U.S.C. § 353b.

(ss) "Person" means individual, corporation, government,
 governmental subdivision or agency, partnership, association or any other
 legal entity.

(tt) "Pharmacist" means any natural person licensed under this act topractice pharmacy.

(uu) "Pharmacist-in-charge" means the pharmacist who is responsible
to the board for a registered establishment's compliance with the laws and
regulations of this state pertaining to the practice of pharmacy,
manufacturing of drugs and the distribution of drugs. The pharmacist-in-

1 charge shall supervise such establishment on a full-time or a part-time 2 basis and perform such other duties relating to supervision of a registered 3 establishment as may be prescribed by the board by rules and regulations. 4 Nothing in this definition shall relieve other pharmacists or persons from 5 their responsibility to comply with state and federal laws and regulations.

6 "Pharmacist intern" means: (1) A student currently enrolled in an (vv) 7 accredited pharmacy program; (2) a graduate of an accredited pharmacy 8 program serving an internship; or (3) a graduate of a pharmacy program 9 located outside of the United States that is not accredited and who has 10 successfully passed equivalency examinations approved by the board.

(ww) "Pharmacy," "drugstore" or "apothecary" means premises, 11 12 laboratory, area or other place: (1) Where drugs are offered for sale where the profession of pharmacy is practiced and where prescriptions are 13 compounded and dispensed; (2) that has displayed upon it or within it the 14 words "pharmacist," "pharmaceutical chemist," "pharmacy," "apothecary," 15 "drugstore," "druggist," "drugs," "drug sundries" or any of these words or 16 17 combinations of these words or words of similar import either in English 18 or any sign containing any of these words; or (3) where the characteristic 19 symbols of pharmacy or the characteristic prescription sign "Rx" may be 20 exhibited. As used in this subsection, premises refers only to the portion of 21 any building or structure leased, used or controlled by the licensee in the 22 conduct of the business registered by the board at the address for which the 23 registration was issued.

24 (xx) "Pharmacy prescription application" means software that is used 25 to process prescription information, is installed on a pharmacy's computers or servers and is controlled by the pharmacy. 26

27 (yy) "Pharmacy technician" means an individual who, under the 28 direct supervision and control of a pharmacist, may perform packaging, 29 manipulative, repetitive or other nondiscretionary tasks related to the processing of a prescription or medication order and who assists the 30 31 pharmacist in the performance of pharmacy-related duties, but who does 32 not perform duties restricted to a pharmacist.

33 (zz) "Practitioner" means a person licensed to practice medicine and 34 surgery, dentist, podiatrist, veterinarian, optometrist or scientific 35 investigator or other person authorized by law to use a prescription-only 36 drug in teaching or chemical analysis or to conduct research with respect 37 to a prescription-only drug.

38 "Preceptor" means a licensed pharmacist who possesses at least (aaa) 39 two years' experience as a pharmacist and who supervises students 40 obtaining the pharmaceutical experience required by law as a condition to 41 taking the examination for licensure as a pharmacist. 42

"Prescriber" means a practitioner or a mid-level practitioner. (bbb)

"Prescription" or "prescription order" means: (1) An order to be 43 (ccc)

filled by a pharmacist for prescription medication issued and signed by a prescriber in the authorized course of such prescriber's professional practice; or (2) an order transmitted to a pharmacist through word of mouth, note, telephone or other means of communication directed by such prescriber, regardless of whether the communication is oral, electronic, facsimile or in printed form.

7 (ddd) "Prescription medication" means any drug, including label and
8 container according to context, that is dispensed pursuant to a prescription
9 order.

(eee) "Prescription-only drug" means any drug whether intended for
use by human or animal, required by federal or state law, including 21
U.S.C. § 353, to be dispensed only pursuant to a written or oral
prescription or order of a practitioner or is restricted to use by practitioners
only.

15 (fff) "Probation" means the practice or operation under a temporary 16 license, registration or permit or a conditional license, registration or 17 permit of a business or profession for which a license, registration or 18 permit is granted by the board under the provisions of the pharmacy act of 19 the state of Kansas requiring certain actions to be accomplished or certain 20 actions not to occur before a regular license, registration or permit is 21 issued.

(ggg) "Product" means the same as defined by part H of the federal
drug supply chain security act, 21 U.S.C. § 351 et seq. and 21 U.S.C. §
360eee.

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(hhh) "Professional incompetency" means:

26 (1) One or more instances involving failure to adhere to the
27 applicable standard of pharmaceutical care to a degree that constitutes
28 gross negligence, as determined by the board;

(2) repeated instances involving failure to adhere to the applicable
 standard of pharmaceutical care to a degree that constitutes ordinary
 negligence, as determined by the board; or

32 (3) a pattern of pharmacy practice or other behavior that demonstrates33 a manifest incapacity or incompetence to practice pharmacy.

(iii) "Readily retrievable" means that records kept by automatic data
processing applications or other electronic or mechanized record-keeping
systems can be separated out from all other records within a reasonable
time not to exceed 48 hours of a request from the board or other authorized
agent or that hard-copy records are kept on which certain items are
asterisked, redlined or in some other manner visually identifiable apart
from other items appearing on the records.

41 (jjj) "Repackage" means changing the container, wrapper, quantity or 42 label of a drug to further the distribution of the drug.

43 (III) "Repackager" means a person who owns or operates a facility

1 that repackages.

(8) the licensee has given a worthless check or stopped payment on a

12 (b) Such denial, refusal to renew, suspension, revocation, probation or limitation of a license or public or private censure of a licensee may be 13 ordered by the board after notice and hearing on the matter in accordance 14 with the provisions of the Kansas administrative procedure act. Upon the 15 16 end of the period of time established by the board for the revocation of a 17 license, application may be made to the board for reinstatement. The board 18 shall have discretion to accept or reject an application for reinstatement 19 and may hold a hearing to consider such reinstatement.
