SUPPLEMENTAL NOTE ON SENATE BILL NO. 204

As Recommended by Senate Committee on Judiciary

Brief*

SB 204 would create a provision within the Kansas Criminal Code to prohibit a court from requiring or ordering a victim of a crime to submit to or undergo a psychiatric or psychological examination in the prosecution for such crime.

Background

The bill was introduced by the Senate Committee on Judiciary at the request of the Kansas County and District Attorneys Association (KCDAA).

Senate Committee on Judiciary

In the Senate Committee hearing on February 17, 2021, a representative of the KCDAA testified as a **proponent** of the bill. Written-only **proponent** testimony was provided by the Kansas Coalition Against Sexual and Domestic Violence.

Written-only neutral testimony was provided by the Kansas Association for Criminal Defense Lawyers. No other testimony was provided.
